## Youth Voter Statistics from Santa Clara County Registrar of Voters

- Santa Clara County is ranked number five in the state for pre-registration of 16 to 17-year-olds.
- Santa Clara County has 7,000 pre-registered 16 to 17-year-olds overall (highest ranked county in the Bay Area)
- Santa Clara County had about six percent of 117,000 per-registrants statewide.
- Registered voters aged 18-24 who voted in the November 2020 election increased compared to 2018.
- In 2020, 93,655 out of 120,960 (77%) voted; whereas, 47,000 out of 95,000 (49%) voted in 2016.

## Youth Opportunities

On September 10, 2020, the California Department of Education approved the criteria for the California State Seal of Civic Engagement (SSCE) "to encourage, and create pathways for, pupils in elementary and secondary schools to become civically engaged in democratic governmental institutions at the local, state, and national levels."


### **Resources**
